Dear Students,

As you know, as part of Syracuse University's comprehensive public health plan (Syracuse University SAFE), all students, including those living off campus, who will be on campus at any time during this semester are required to participate in current and ongoing COVID-19 surveillance testing. As we shared with you last week, the University commenced its second round of COVID-19 surveillance testing of all students last week.

If you met SU's original requirements and have been cleared for access to campus, but you have not participated in the second round of COVID-19 surveillance testing, please do so tomorrow, **Thursday, Sept. 17 or Friday, Sept. 18**. Testing centers are located on the Kenneth A. Shaw Quad (North Campus; two stations), and at the [Skybarn](#) (South Campus) and are open daily from 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. No appointment is necessary.

According to SU's records, many of you have not yet participated in this surveillance testing. Some of you have not even sent the results of your pre-arrival tests, and a few of you have not sent evidence of compliance with the quarantine requirements that applied to you. We will be in touch with those of you who fall in the latter categories by separate email. In the meantime, you are not permitted to come to campus for surveillance testing or for any other reason.

As a reminder, failure to comply with testing procedures is a violation of the Code of Student Conduct and will result in a disciplinary referral to the Office of Student Rights and Responsibilities. Disciplinary action will be taken as of the close of this second round of surveillance testing.

Please also know that the College of Law must disclose any disciplinary action to bar authorities who make take that information into consideration in their assessments of your character and fitness for purposes of bar eligibility.

Periodic surveillance testing is a critical component to our efforts to mitigate the potential spread of COVID-19 on our campus and will continue throughout the semester. Your participation is and will continue to be necessary to protect the health and safety of all campus community members. Stay safe. Do your part.
